New Guidance on How to Appropriately Triage Combative Patients and AMA

As a high-reliability organization, Virtua prioritizes everyone's safety. And our colleagues must first feel safe to deliver the best possible care.

To support a safe environment, a multidisciplinary team has amended the "AMA (Against Medical Advice) & Elopement" policy to include an algorithm for deescalation decision-making. Specifically, the algorithm provides scenario-specific guidance to reduce opportunities for aggressive or combative patients to potentially harm colleagues or themselves.

Virtua Remains at the Ready Should There Be a Measles Outbreak

A measles <u>outbreak in a rural Texas county</u> is raising alarm among those in the public health community who warn that the largely conquered disease could be making a resurgence.

There are at least 58 confirmed cases of measles and 13 hospitalizations in rural West Texas, as of <u>Tuesday</u>, with another eight cases in neighboring New Mexico.

The New Jersey Department of Health warned residents <u>last week</u> that a person with measles recently visited the emergency department at Englewood Hospital in Bergen County.

"At Virtua, we've been preparing since the summer for potential measles cases," said Martin Topiel, MD, chief infection control officer. "The pediatric and adult emergency departments along with urgent care centers have had team planning meetings including approaches for early recognition on entry of suspected measles patients to Virtua campuses so to minimize potential exposures of colleagues and 'waiting room' patients."

Dr. Topiel also noted that early recognition, along with appropriate communication and signage in the departments will be key, along with ongoing education of our colleagues. "Measles vaccine is still an extremely effective prevention approach in our toolbox, and it is safe," he said.

Virtua Medical Director of Research Addresses Access to CDC Data

Federal health agencies last week restored several webpages and datasets, following <u>a judge's order</u> to bring back public access to information that had been removed to comply with a presidential executive order. While the temporary restraining order is now in effect, the research community is <u>working</u> to find alternative ways to host important government health data and guidance online.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention last week restored nine webpages and datasets, but not all that were taken down, including data on transgender health.

"The CDC is essentially being censored for political reasons," said Robert E. Post, MD, medical director of research at Virtua Health, as well as chair of the Department of Family Medicine and vice president of Virtua Medical Staff (South Division). "This is dangerous, and there is no role for politics in science. Having easy access to what is supposed to be freely available CDC data allows researchers to find important associations that can impact health for all Americans. Research is what moves the practice of medicine forward. Impediments to that only work to slow progress in patient care."

ARTEMIS Trial Examines Heart Attack Treatment

Virtua Research periodically shares trials for your consideration. The ARTEMIS study is seeking to demonstrate the efficacy and safety of ziltivekimab (an IL-6 inhibitor) versus placebo in reducing the risk of major adverse cardiovascular events when initiated as early as possible in adult patients with ST-elevation and non-ST-elevation myocardial infarction. A brief synopsis of the eligibility criteria is listed below.

Inclusion/exclusion criteria include:

- Inclusion: Hospitalization for acute myocardial infarction with evidence of type 1 MI by invasive angiography performed at a site with PCI capabilities
- Exclusion: CABG or use of fibrinolytic therapy for treatment of the current AMI
 - Chronic heart failure is classified as being in New York Heart Association (NYHA) Class IV

The remaining inclusion/exclusion criteria are extensive and can be shared by reaching out to our research team.
