Measles Update: Resources and Readiness

As per <u>news coverage</u> this week, there are growing fears that a <u>Shakira concert in New Jersey at MetLife Stadium</u> last week may have been a measles superspreader event because a person went to see the singer while infectious. A warning released by the New Jersey Department of Health said potentially exposed individuals could develop symptoms as late as June 6.

As reported here in *Clinician Update* in previous weeks, Virtua's readiness preparations continue for the possibility of a measles outbreak. The infection prevention team is working with its partners across Virtua to prepare for possible cases presenting to our emergency departments, urgent cares, and VMG practices.

Martin Topiel, MD, Virtua's chief infection control officer, stressed awareness and readiness. "While patients with more obvious rashes may trigger suspicion for measles during our medical patient encounters in provider offices, urgent cares, and EDs, it may be the patients unknowingly exposed who initially present with non-specific symptoms such as fever, cough, or sore throat, that may actually pose risk and be contagious to the population and our colleagues."

Launch of Armed Security Officer Program

This week, the Armed Security Officer Program launched at Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital. This new initiative aims to enhance safety, de-escalate potentially volatile situations, and respond quickly to security threats. The program will roll out to Virtua Mount Holly Hospital in June, with other hospitals to follow.

The program will feature one armed officer on duty 24 hours a day. These officers will be certified through Allied Universal Armed Security and will not be direct Virtua employees. Their primary role is deterrence and rapid response to threats involving weapons by individuals seeking harm. It's important to note that these officers will not respond to general in-house security assist calls.

The armed security officer will be cross trained in the use of the Evolv system and can supplement existing security officers if needed. Their station will be in the main lobby until it closes, after which they will relocate to the emergency department entrance.

- Increase provider comfort with high-dose opioid management in severe fentanyl withdrawal while avoiding oversedation and build confidence in transitioning patients to buprenorphine without triggering withdrawal.
- Strengthen discharge planning for patients with sub-stance dependence, ensuring timely follow-up with addiction services (e.g., methadone or buprenorphine clinics) to reduce relapse and overdose risk.
