As reported in *Clinician Update* last week, longtime regional leader Reconstructive Orthopedics is slated to become part of Virtua Medical Group in July. The practices will operate under the name Virtua Reconstructive Orthopedics. All staff members in good standing—about 300 people—are being invited to transition to the Virtua workforce, and patient care will continue without interruption. "Virtua has long been dedicated to quality health care close to home, and views this as fundamental to a person's quality of life," said Dennis W. Pullin, FACHE, president and CEO of Virtua. #### New Mobile Program Provides Free Mammograms, Other Screenings

Whether they are uninsured, can't take off from work, or face other obstacles, people often skip important screenings that can catch cancer early—when it's most treatable. To boost access to this care, Virtua has introduced a state-of-the-art <u>Mobile Health and Cancer Screening Unit</u>. This 40-foot clinic on wheels travels to communities across Burlington and Camden counties, providing free mammograms, Pap tests, PSA tests for prostate cancer, and more. #### Virtua's Attention to Addressing Maternal Mortality for Black Women

The United States has one of the highest rates of maternal mortality among high-income countries. With April being National Minority Health Month, and with Black Maternal Health Week already quickly behind us, ever important is the reminder that awareness is year round. It is why Virtua is providing education and training for clinicians and patients.

"We are taking steps to improve our communication with patients and between maternal-child health team members–attending physicians, resident physicians, nurse midwives, and nurses," said Nicole Lamborne, MD, vice president of clinical operations for Women's Services at Virtua Health.

"It means approaching each patient from the mindset that more information is better than less," said Theresa Adeliyi, MD, medical director of the Virtua Center for Women. "We find that when patients are armed with such detailed information, it provides them with a framework from which they feel comfortable and confident to express concerns that they may otherwise hesitate to bring up.

Virtua is also a birth facility member of the <u>Southern New Jersey Perinatal Cooperative</u>, which endeavors to incorporate practical changes to our approach in care of women in our region.
