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Virtua Chief Clinical Officer Reg Blaber, MD, Offers Insights on Empathy and Experience

A new <u>study</u> finds that some <u>patients feel health care providers will judge them</u> for expressing mistaken or inaccurate beliefs—creating a communication gap that can lead to ineffective treatments and missed opportunities. The researchers suggest doctors need to overcome their tendency to judge patients and encourage them to share their thoughts.

"A meaningful health care encounter hinges upon open communication and trust between the provider and patient," said Reg Blaber, MD, executive vice president and chief clinical officer at Virtua. "It is critical that patients have a safe space to ask questions, share their concerns, and receive personalized feedback free from judgment."

To assist clinicians, Dr. Blaber stressed the importance of our shared Practicing Excellence journey. "We are in year two of a systemwide program that addresses patient experience, relationship-building, self-awareness, and far more. Every colleague, regardless of role, participates in an ongoing skill-development series designed to enhance human understanding, communication, respect, and empathy."

Spyral Affirm Trial

Virtua Research periodically shares trials for your consideration. A brief synopsis with the eligibility criteria for the SPYRAL AFFIRM Global Clinical Study of Renal Denervation with the Symplicity Spyral Renal Denervation System in Subjects with Uncontrolled Hypertension (SPYRAL AFFIRM) trial is listed below. If you have a patient who meets the criteria, please contact the Virtua Research team at research@virtua.org, and a research coordinator will review their eligibility with you. If your patient is enrolled, we will keep you updated on their progress. Physician colleagues are vital to the success of the research program, even when they are not participating as an investigator. Kintur Sanghvi, MD, is the principal investigator for this trial.

The SPYRAL AFFIRM study will evaluate the long-term safety, efficacy, and durability of the Symplicity Spyral system in a population of approximately 1,300 renal denervation-treated subjects with up to 36 months of follow-up. The Symplicity Spyral Renal Denervation system is comprised of a single-use, disposable catheter (Symplicity Spyral catheter) and a reusable Symplicity G3 or the next-generation radiofrequency (RF) generator. The intended use is to deliver low-level RF energy through the wall of the renal artery to denervate the human kidney. The Symplicity Spyral catheter and Symplicity G3

generator received CE mark in October 2023, followed by FDA approval in November 2023. They are commercially available in selected geographies.

The Symplicity Spyral Renal Denervation system is indicated to reduce blood pressure as an adjunctive treatment in patients with hypertension in whom lifestyle modifications and antihypertensive medications do not adequately control blood pressure. The population eligible for inclusion into this study includes subjects with uncontrolled hypertension. The individual is diagnosed with hypertension and has an average baseline office systolic blood pressure ≥140 mmHg. Exclusion criteria are individuals with renal artery anatomy that are ineligible for treatment, including at least one main renal artery with a diameter of less than 3 mm or greater than 8 mm. The remaining inclusion/exclusion criteria are extensive and can be shared by reaching out to our research team.

Now in Effect: New Visiting Hours at Virtua Hospitals

As reported here last week, new visiting hours for Virtua hospitals are now in effect. This change is intended to provide a safe and restful environment for all.

Visiting hours are now 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily at all five Virtua hospitals.

Please note these additional visiting guidelines:

- All visitors must be at least 12 years old. Anyone under 16 years old must always be accompanied by an adult.
- All visitors are required to obtain a visitor pass upon arrival.
- Only two visitors should be at the patient's bedside at a time. Additional visitors are asked to wait in a lounge or common area.

As before, each patient may identify one or two people to participate in their care, called Care Partners. One Care Partner may stay with the patient beyond general visiting hours, as needed. Overnight accommodation can be granted on a case-by-case basis.

As always, specific departments within the hospital—such as the emergency department, pediatrics, and maternity—have their own distinct set of visitor guidelines, which are posted on the Virtua website.

Safety Update: Staff Safety Technology to Begin Rollout

Virtua is committed to fostering safe environments for everyone, including our workforce. In response to colleague feedback, Virtua will soon launch a new staff safety technology called Commure Strongline Pro at select hospital departments/units. Virtua Mount Holly Hospital's emergency department, pediatric emergency department, and behavioral health unit will be the first to onboard Commure Strongline Pro, beginning in late September.

Commure Strongline Pro will provide colleagues in select roles with special badges that can be worn alongside the Virtua-issued ID badge. Should the wearer feel unsafe for any reason, they can double-

press the badge to send an alert to in-house security staff and other colleagues in the vicinity. The alert will inform authorized staff who is in duress and their exact real-time location.

The goal is to prevent and de-escalate incidents of (verbal or physical) threats or harm by providing colleagues with an instantaneous and discreet way of requesting assistance. To better understand the technology, its uses, and the rollout plan, please consult these FAQs.
