## 288 Future Physicians Become First Class in Rowan-Virtua SOM

This past Sunday, <u>Rowan-Virtua School of Osteopathic Medicine</u> officially welcomed the Class of 2027, the first to embark on the medical school journey through Virtua Health's partnership with Rowan that formed the <u>Virtua Health College of Medicine & Life Sciences</u>. Because of the large class size, 288 future physicians took part in two separate white coat ceremonies at the university's main campus in Glassboro.

Students were greeted with remarks from Reginald Blaber, MD, Virtua's executive vice president and chief clinical officer. Dr. Blaber encouraged the students and reminded them that the visible symbol of the white coat "invites them into the lives of others in their most vulnerable moments, trusting you implicitly to always do what is in their best interest."

Over 75% of the students hail from New Jersey; 17% from South Jersey. The class represents 12 states, with attendees from as far as California and even Canada. Notably, the majority of the class identify as female.

## Virtua Surgeon Reaches 'Elite' Milestone for Robotic Procedures

Virtua colorectal surgeon Keith Meslin, MD, recently performed his 1,000th robotic procedure. That places him in the top 1% (or 99th percentile) nationally for the number of these advanced colorectal surgeries.

"Dr. Meslin has joined a small group of the country's most elite robotic surgeons who have achieved this milestone," said Jennifer Khelil, DO, Virtua's senior vice president and chief medical officer. "His clinical skills and expertise are among the very best in the nation."

Dr. Meslin was the first in the Philadelphia/South Jersey region to perform robotic colorectal surgery, starting in 2010. A practicing surgeon for 19 years, he is a faculty member of the Penn Medicine | Virtua Health Cancer Program and a clinical assistant professor at Rowan-Virtua School of Osteopathic Medicine.

"I'm privileged to help so many of my South Jersey neighbors with a range of colorectal conditions," said Dr. Meslin. "At Virtua, I feel fortunate to be part of a skilled and caring team that truly puts our patients first."

*U.S. News & World Report* has recognized Virtua Voorhees Hospital as a High Performing Hospital for Colon Cancer Surgery for more than five years in a row. And Virtua last year became one of just 50

providers nationally to receive the prestigious American College of Surgeons' National Accreditation for Rectal Cancer designation. Moreover, Virtua has performed more robotic surgeries than any other South Jersey provider—over 20,000 of these procedures to date.

### Support Groups to Start for Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias

In what can be a resource for families of patients you may know, the Rowan-Virtua New Jersey Institute for Successful Aging, an affiliate of Virtua Medical Group, will be hosting monthly support groups for caregivers of individuals diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. There will be one virtual group offered on the first Wednesday of each month from 3 to 4:30 p.m., and one in-person support group offered on the third Monday of each month from 9:30 to 11 a.m.

Here is the link to join (or share) the first virtual group via Zoom on Wednesday, Sept. 6 at 3 p.m.

The first *in-person* group is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 18 at 9:30 a.m. The in-person group will be held on the 3rd Floor, Room 3000 of the Rowan Medical Building, located at 42 E. Laurel Rd in Stratford.

These groups will offer a forum for caregivers to talk through challenges they are facing, seek advice and resources from their peers, and to offer one another emotional support on this caregiving journey, all in a non-judgmental space. Groups will be facilitated by a licensed clinical social worker and masters-level social work student-interns. We ask that these groups remain for the caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias (other diagnoses might include vascular dementia, Lewy body dementia, frontotemporal dementia/FTD, mild cognitive impairment). Caregivers may be a spouse, an adult child, or any family member or close friend who is intimately involved in providing care for their loved one. These groups are free, and registration is not required. They are open to the community, so feel free to share with other caregivers you may know.

### Guides Needed for Musicians On Call

Would you, or someone you know, want to be a part of the healing power of music?

Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital is getting ready for the return of in-person, bedside performances by <u>Musicians on Call (MOC)</u>, a nonprofit organization that has performed to more than 10,000 patients, staff and visitors at the hospital in over a dozen years of performances. While MOC has successfully lined up performers to provide the music, the program can use a fresh supply of volunteer guides.

"With in-person performances returning for the first time since the pandemic, more guides are needed to help ensure the MOC's success." said Tiffany Lockett, director of Volunteer Services and Spiritual Care at Virtua. "They accompany the musicians to patient rooms so to help the process move most effectively, and with great reward for all."

Volunteers are needed to escort the musicians, communicate with staff and patients, and heighten the MOC experience. They know the protocols, policies, and expectations, and are responsible for making sure these guidelines are upheld during the shift. Guides must commit to volunteering once a month for at least one year. The in-person programs are usually held once a week in the early evening.
