Virtua Performs State's First Tigereye ST Case for Treatment of PAD

This week, Michael Lieb, DO, vascular surgeon with Virtua Surgical Group and medical director of The Vein Center at Virtua & Non-Invasive Vascular Lab, was first in New Jersey to utilize the Tigereye ST, Avinger's next-generation image-guided chronic total occlusion (CTO) crossing system. Tigereye ST incorporates design upgrades to the tip configuration and catheter shaft to increase crossing power and procedural success in challenging lesions. Additionally, the device includes enhancements for ease of image interpretation during the procedure.

Dr. Lieb also presented a noteworthy case featuring a hybrid approach for optimal results. The patient's complex dissection flap in the distal CFA, extending into the PFA and SFA, led to chronic embolization and disabling claudication, marking the inaugural use of Tigereye ST in New Jersey a significant stride in health care innovation.

Dr. Lieb employed a comprehensive strategy, combining open femoral artery reconstruction with endovascular treatment of the SFA CTO. The procedure involved skillful crossing with Tigereye ST and targeted treatment using Pantheris 7F. This innovative hybrid intervention demonstrates the commitment to achieving optimal outcomes in challenging vascular cases.

Virtua Launches Palm Vein Scanning at Patient Registration

Virtua has launched palm vein scanning in patient registration to ensure accurate identification. The scanning device is called PatientSecure and is manufactured by Imprivata. The biometric technology utilizes vein scanning to identify each patient by using the unique characteristics of their palm veins. Palm vein scanning provides a fast and safe way to correctly identify each participating patient and accurately link to their medical record.

"Identification with palm vein scanning prevents misidentification of patients, eliminates serious safety events, and ensures clinicians are looking at the right record for the right patient," said Jennifer Khelil, DO, MBA, senior vice president and chief medical officer at Virtua. "Using palm vein scanning for patient identification also decreases chart duplication and gives clinicians access to a more complete patient medical history."

The device is currently being introduced to multiple Virtua departments beginning in Washington Township. It will be rolled out system-wide in a phased approach in early 2024.

Virtua registrars will make the one-time enrollment easy by assisting the patients. Once enrolled, the patient will use the palm scanner at patient registration throughout all Virtua care locations.

"Patients trust their clinical providers," said Dr. Khelil. "So, it's important for clinicians and all colleagues to emphasize the safety and accuracy of palm vein scanning in patient identification."

Virtua Hand Hygiene Policy Updated

Hand hygiene is one of the most fundamental strategies to preventing infections and has become increasingly vital as we face the threat of multidrug resistant organisms. With that in mind, the Virtua Hand Hygiene Policy has been updated and includes some significant changes:

All colleagues with direct patient contact are **strongly encouraged to avoid** artificial nails, extenders, wraps, gels, and gel nail polish.

All colleagues that work in the following roles or areas within Virtua are **prohibited** from wearing artificial nails, extenders, wraps, gels, and gel nail polish:

- ICU
- NICU/SCN
- Surgical services
- Dialysis
- Compounding pharmacy
- All other perioperative settings
- Staff who insert central lines

All colleagues will need to sign the following attestation at hire and annually when completing the Infection Prevention module, which is part of the annual online competencies:

I confirm that I have completed the Infection Prevention module and:

- Understand how hand hygiene prevents infections
- Know when to perform hand hygiene
- Know how to perform hand hygiene, including the minimum time required, using alcohol-based sanitizer or soap and water
- Know when to change my gloves
- Know that if I have direct patient contact, I am strongly encouraged to avoid artificial fingernails, extenders, wraps, gels, and gel nail polish
- Know that if I have direct patient contact and work in the following areas, I am prohibited from wearing artificial fingernails, extenders, wraps, gels, and gel nail polish

The Joint Commission places a high priority on hand hygiene and will be checking to see that our practice across the system matches our policy.
