Introducing MyStory, a New Feature on Epic

Virtua is adding a new feature to Epic called MyStory. Created by NRC Health, MyStory is designed to enhance patient care and drive loyalty by helping clinicians understand what matters most to our patients as people. Here is how it works:

Starting soon, patients can log into MyChart and select MyStory from the main menu. This will guide them through a series of prompts about their joys, pressures, goals, and more. Patients can update their responses at any time.

Clinicians can then access this information as part of the patient's medical record on Epic. They can quickly peruse what the patient has shared and discuss it during their next encounter.

Research shows that providers who use MyStory have better patient interactions that do not require additional time.

Rick Levine, MD, has piloted MyStory at two primary care practices. He says, "The information patients have shared via MyStory gives me greater insights into who they are—their personality, their preferences, and the factors that shape their lives. All of this helps me facilitate conversations that are specific to the individual and establish greater trust."

Access to MyStory will roll out to all primary care practices this week. Primary care providers will see the MyChart field added to patients' medical records on Epic. In the weeks ahead, access to MyStory will expand to specialty care practices and the hospitals.

Patients will learn about MyStory through MyChart appointment reminders, dedicated emails, collateral materials, and the Virtua website.

Winter Weather Intensifies Emergency Blood Shortage

National Blood Donor Month is coming to an end, and parts of New Jersey, particularly in the north, are grappling with a severe blood shortage. That is why <u>New Jersey Blood Services declared a regional blood emergency</u>, citing a 30% decline in donations in recent weeks.

Nationally, the American Red Cross continues to experience <u>an emergency</u> <u>blood shortage</u> as severe winter weather has further impacted the ability to rebuild the blood supply. Blood and platelet donors are urged to give now to help ensure lifesaving medical procedures are not delayed.

"As for Virtua, our blood supplies are currently sufficient," said Kimberly Frymire, MBA, SBB, corporate blood bank manager. "But as is the case in the region, we are working through a shortage of platelets and Rh-negative red cell supplies."

The good news is that donor appointments are strong in the weeks ahead, and hopefully the inventory will rebound and stabilize. "That said, it is always good to promote local blood drives," said Frymire. "Blood donors are life savers."

Redefine-HF Trial

Virtua Research periodically shares trials for your consideration. The Redefine-HF trial is a randomized trial to determine the efficacy and safety of finerenone on morbidity and mortality among heart failure patients with a left ventricular ejection fraction greater than or equal to 40% and are hospitalized due to an episode of acute decompensated heart failure. Establishing that finerenone can provide an early reduction in the risk of HF events and CV death among patients with acute HFp/mrEF would significantly change clinical practice as this remains an unmet clinical need. Dr. Tolulope Agunbiade, medical director of the Virtua Advanced Heart Failure program, is the principal investigator for this trial. Here are just a few of the inclusion/exclusion criteria:

Inclusion: Current hospitalization or recently discharged (within 10 days prior to screening) with the primary diagnosis of HF

Exclusion: Treatment with an MRA (finerenone, spironolactone, eplerenone, canrenone, esaxerenone) within 30 days prior to randomization; treatment with MRA should not be interrupted for the purpose of enrollment into the study

Dr. Mazza and Dr. Yin Leading Research on Immune Response in Sepsis

Virtua and Rowan researchers are collaborating on a project that may eventually benefit patients with sepsis. These patients have been shown to produce myeloid-derived suppressor cells (MDSCs), which are believed to contribute to immunosuppression during sepsis and can lead to secondary and/or persistent infection. This, in turn, contributes to increased morbidity and mortality in sepsis.

Kingsley Yin, PhD, associate professor of neuroscience and cell biology in the Rowan-Virtua School of Osteopathic Medicine, and Emilio Mazza, MD, PhD, medical director of the ICU at Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital and assistant professor, Institute for Regenerative Medicine and Transplantation, Rowan-Virtua School of Translational Biomedical Engineering and Sciences, have collaborated as part of a translational research project looking at the effects of specialized pro-resolving mediators (SPMs) on immune cell function. SPMs modulate the actions of all immune cells of myeloid lineage, such as neutrophils, monocytes, and lymphocytes. Drs. Yin and Mazza have hypothesized that one such SPM, resolvin D2 (RvD2), can modulate the actions of MDSCs and monocytes/macrophages to reduce immunosuppression in humans with sepsis.

The study will be conducted at Virtua Mount Holly and Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes hospitals. Blood will be obtained from patients \geq 18 years old diagnosed with sepsis within one to three days of enrollment into the trial. The blood will be taken to Dr. Yin's lab, where he will identify MDSCs and then treat the MDSCs with RvD2 versus saline placebo. The cells will then be exposed to lipopolysaccharide mimicking bacteria and the cytokine response assessed. The results of this collaborative research project will allow for a better understanding of the immune response in sepsis and explore potential therapies that could modify that response.
