Virtua Health Using A.I. Technology to Enhance Colon Cancer Screenings

Last week, Virtua presented an interactive demonstration of new technology that helps doctors detect the presence of possible precancerous lesions during colonoscopies. The GI Genius™ intelligent endoscopy module helps physicians identify difficult-to-spot polyps during a colonoscopy—the most effective tool for identifying colon cancer. Virtua is the first in the Greater Philadelphia region and New Jersey to implement this technology at all of its hospitals.

"GI Genius is like a second set of eyes for the physician during a colonoscopy," said Gregory Seltzer, MD, medical director of Virtua GI and Digestive Health. "This technology combines the skill and training of the gastroenterologist with the latest innovation in colon cancer detection."

"Colon cancer is one of the most treatable cancer types when it's detected early, which is why we encourage everyone 45 and older to participate in routine colonoscopies or as advised by their doctor," said Keith Meslin, MD, section chief for colorectal surgery at Virtua. "With the addition of GI Genius and other recent technological advances, we are helping to ensure the people of South Jersey have access to the latest, greatest care," he said.

Virtua Orthopedic Surgeon Co-Authors Article Evaluating the Safety of Cryoneurolysis

Cryoneurolysis is a minimally invasive procedure performed in the office that numbs the nerves around the knee joint. The procedure utilizes extreme cold temperatures and is typically done before knee surgeries, such as replacements and ACL reconstructions. Cryoneurolysis has been shown in the literature to require less postoperative narcotics for patient due to the numbing effect of the pain receptors.

A recently published multi-center study involving Virtua and Louisiana State University (LSU) was designed to evaluate the safety of cryoneurolysis as a preoperative treatment for total knee arthroplasty (TKA). The findings are encouraging and suggest that cryoneurolysis is a relatively safe adjunct procedure without an increased risk of major or minor complications when used as a preoperative treatment for TKA.

According to the study's lead author, Virtua Orthopedics & Spine's Sean Mc Millan DO, FAOAO, "Postoperative pain is common for your patients, however, not something that should prevent them from reclaiming the quality of life that they deserve. It is why my partners and I have been performing cryoneurolysis on our preoperative knee replacement patients for the last several years with excellent outcomes. In addition, we have seen amazing results in keeping our young athletes off opioids entirely after ACL surgery by integrating this technology. The purpose of this study was to examine the potential for any complications related to total knee surgery by integrating this procedure. Our results show that, in this small multi-center cohort, there appears to be no greater risk of complication to our patients."
