Virtua's COVID-19 Vaccination Requirement Lifted

In line with recent changes to state and federal requirements regarding COVID-19 vaccines, Virtua is lifting its COVID-19 vaccination requirements for all colleagues, clinicians, and other health care personnel working in Virtua facilities, effective immediately.

On June 12, New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy signed Executive Order 322 lifting the COVID-19 vaccination requirement for employees in health care settings, which had required Virtua colleagues and health care personnel to be "up to date" on their vaccinations. The governor's order aligns New Jersey with recent updates to federal requirements and reflects the different circumstances in our state now, as compared to the past few years.

The overwhelming majority of Virtua's workforce is already up to date with their COVID vaccinations, which will continue to benefit our community and patients. COVID-19 vaccines have proven to be safe and effective, and Virtua will continue to encourage—but not require—all new and existing colleagues to remain up to date on their vaccinations.

Thank you to all of our colleagues for your steadfast compliance with the required mandates over the past few years. Vaccination has been a key public health tool to protect our health care workers, the community, and our patients.

Rowan Integration Go-Live Update

As reported here last week, Rowan Medicine and Virtua reached a significant milestone in our partnership with the successful "Day One" of our Epic journey. The achievement marked an important step forward in our academic affiliation, as 130 Rowan Medicine clinicians officially became affiliates of Virtua Medical Group (VMG), which will provide greater access and continuity of care for the people of South Jersey.

Under the new aligned name, "Rowan Medicine, an Affiliate of Virtua Medical Group," Rowan Medicine clinicians are now part of a network that is comprised of more than 1,200 Virtua-employed and fellow affiliate providers.

With nearly two weeks of go-live complete in the electronic medical record launch at all Rowan Medicine locations, incredible progress has been made thus far. Daily calls, tickets, and escalations continue to decline. As such, the project leadership team will begin to taper some of the at-the-elbow support starting next week. Each practice will still have dedicated support, but the total numbers will be decreased in each area.

Virtua's Education Programs Welcome New Residents

Virtua recently welcomed 75 new residents and fellows to our Graduate Medical Education (GME) programs. We now host over 125 learners in 12 programs, which is 50 more than last year. We also continue to provide core educational experiences for more than 70 students through our academic partner, Rowan Virtua School of Osteopathic Medicine. This growth demonstrates our commitment to academics as we address the health care workforce of the region and the needs of our community.

Virtua's GME programs attract residents from diverse geographic locations, ranging from as close as Rowan University to as far as China, with others coming from medical schools across the country and around the world. The inclusion of residents from such varied backgrounds adds to the richness of our programs, promoting cultural diversity and fostering a global perspective in health care. The experiences and perspectives that these residents bring help to create a collaborative and inclusive learning environment.

"We take pride in the start of our new Internal Medicine and General Surgery programs, accredited by ACGME (Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education)," said Richard G. Paluzzi, MD, medical director of medical education and the designated institutional official at Virtua. "Our Internal Medicine program is welcoming a class of 18 first-year residents to a three-year program, and our General Surgery program welcomes an inaugural group of 15 residents distributed evenly across the first, second, and third years of a five-year program. We have also expanded our Psychiatry residency, and are in the process of merging two Family Medicine residencies, capitalizing on the strengths of two excellent programs in order to create one program that is even better."

Virtua's GME programs not only offer fellowship opportunities in Osteopathic Neuromusculoskeletal Medicine (ONMM), Geriatric Medicine, and Geriatric Psychiatry, but also host a fellowship in Cardiovascular Disease and has plans to expand its offerings in the future. "This year, we've seen dramatic growth in education across the health system with the addition of new GME programs, as well as undergraduate medical education," said Dr. Paluzzi.

Medical Student Saves Woman's Life with CPR

Last winter, Karen Silverio collapsed in the parking lot of Rowan Virtua College of Osteopathic Medicine. A Rowan University police officer started chest compressions, and minutes later, third-year student Krzysztof Zembrzuski pulled into the lot. "He came over and he gave me CPR compressions," Silverio said. "He did them correctly and he definitely saved my life." The Power of the Human Experience Story of Resilience and Connection at Virtua Willingboro Hospital

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The human experience holds immeasurable power. The team at Virtua Willingboro Hospital's emergency department (ED) has demonstrated that nurturing human connections can lift us up in the face of triumph and tragedy.

On a fateful Tuesday, the ED team found themselves confronted with an unimaginable situation. A young pregnant woman, discovered unresponsive in the field, was rushed to the ED in cardiac arrest. Despite the resuscitation efforts of the paramedics and the ED team, the woman and her unborn child could not be saved.

In the aftermath of this tragedy, the leaders at Virtua Willingboro recognized the importance of supporting their team members during such difficult times. During their debrief with the team, they ensured that every colleague had an opportunity to grieve, process their emotions, and share their thoughts and concerns. Open and honest conversations were encouraged to navigate through the pain and allow the healing process to begin.

Just two days later, the Virtua Willingboro ED team experienced the cycle of life come full circle. A young woman arrived at the ED in labor, and the team rallied together once again. Their commitment and teamwork resulted in the safe delivery of a healthy baby.

Kit O'Neal, nurse director of the Virtua Willingboro ED, recalls both events:

"These are two incredible stories of support and teamwork. When we learned that another patient was on the way, our team stayed present, dedicated, and unified. We cheered for the expectant mother, standing by her side every step of the way. And when the baby entered the world, and we heard that first cry, we joined in celebration with the baby's parents. It was an absolutely breathtaking moment. Though we may be a small group, our hearts are big, and we emerged from this experience with gratitude for each other."

The ED team's journey from tragedy to triumph showcases how WE Thrive together through our resilience and strength that lies within the human spirit. It highlights the power of the Practicing Excellence principles of making human connections and lifting each other up. This remarkable story serves as a reminder to us all that even in the face of devastating loss, hope can be found, and joy can be restored.
