
# Virtua Health Doctors' Day – That's a Wrap!

# Cures Act — Suggested Reading

It has now been over a year since the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Cures Act was implemented. The Act has fundamentally impacted health care, most particularly in how and when patients receive information about their care. It has been instrumental in elevating how language impacts both access to and quality of care. OpenNotes.org, a non-profit organization dedicated to researching the effects of transparent communication, shares a monthly newsletter that spotlights important new research that you may find of interest. We share two of those recommendations here:

- <u>Negative patient descriptors: documenting racial bias in the electronic health record</u>, *Health Affairs*, Sun M, Oliwa T, Peek M, et al.
- <u>Sharing clinical notes and electronic health records with people affected by mental health</u> <u>conditions: scoping review</u>, *Journal of Medical Internet Research Mental Health*, Schwarz J, Barkas, Blease C, et al.

Currently, there are no refugees at the base, nor will new refugees arrive. With your team's help, we relocated and facilitated the transition of more than 16,000 Afghan refugees to their new lives in the U.S. Your assistance has been crucial in providing the care and compassion desperately needed during this difficult time. Thank you for your efforts."*
- To celebrate the success of "Operation Allies Welcome," as well as moving the needle on patient satisfaction and Google ratings, Virtua leaders enjoyed a night out at a Philadelphia Flyers game. Kit O'Neal, director of emergency services at Virtua Willingboro Hospital, shared: "Team ER unites with the common goal of community-based philanthropy, mainly focused on our Willingboro neighbors—it is truly authentic and beautiful to watch.
