Virtua Opens New Center to Expand Access to Heart Failure Care

Virtua recently opened an Advanced Heart Failure Center within Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes Hospital. This location will serve as both a hub for *advanced* heart failure care and an additional outpatient site, joining Virtua's well-established heart failure sites in Burlington, Camden, and Gloucester counties.

"Our goal is to help patients with heart failure live their healthiest possible life," said Tolulope Agunbiade, MD, medical director of Virtua's Advanced Heart Failure Program. ""We like to say that we deal in heart function, not heart failure. Our care teams work collaboratively to ensure they receive appropriate guideline-directed medical therapy and pursue any additional diagnostic or therapeutic interventions that can help improve their condition and health."

Opening this advanced center heightens Virtua's longstanding history of caring for heart failure patients in southern New Jersey and improves access for those living with heart failure in the City of Camden and beyond.

"We are excited to be able to offer these services closer to home for so many people," said Dr. Agunbiade.

The center also provides a base for Virtua's expanding left ventricular assist device (LVAD) program. Currently, Virtua cares for patients with existing LVADs and participates in "shared care" of LVAD patients. This means patients diagnosed with end-stage heart failure are referred to a regional implanting center to receive their heart pump and then returned to the care of their local cardiologist.

"Our goal is to offer LVAD implantation right here at Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes in the near future," said Theresa Rowe, Virtua's administrative director of heart failure.

Antibiotic Awareness Week, Nov. 18 to 24

U.S. Antibiotic Awareness Week is an annual observance that raises awareness of the threat of antibiotic resistance and the importance of improving antibiotic prescribing and use. At Virtua Health, we use this time to spotlight our Antimicrobial Stewardship Program (ASP), whose mission it is to target these same principles.

ASP works year-round to promote appropriate antibiotic use, prioritize patient safety, and minimize antibiotic resistance in our hospitals. Jessica Colmerauer, PharmD, BCIDP, infectious diseases clinical pharmacy specialist, answers a few questions below about one of the programs main initiatives—penicillin allergy assessment:

How does having a listed penicillin allergy impact care? Patients with reported penicillin allergies are more likely to receive suboptimal therapy and experience negative outcomes, including increased length of stay and increased risk of surgical site infection. Alternative therapies to beta-lactams, such as clindamycin and fluoroquinolones, carry a higher risk of causing *C. difficile* infection. Efforts to clarify penicillin allergies with patients can positively influence future care, even beyond the current hospital admission.

What is the best way to clarify penicillin allergies with patients? The best way to clarify these allergies is through conversation with the patient, family, and/or caregiver(s). The following few questions can offer valuable context. Documenting important details in the Epic allergy section can help other clinicians make critical decisions in the future.

- What drug was your reaction to?
- What was the reaction you experienced?
- When did you experience the reaction?
- Have you ever taken a similar medication since you had this reaction?

For patients with true penicillin allergies, what beta-lactams can be used safely? Many patients with true penicillin allergies can still safely receive cephalosporin therapy. Current recommendations from the allergy societies AAAAI & ACAAI endorse that patients with non-anaphylactic penicillin allergies can receive any cephalosporin normally. For patients with a history of anaphylactic penicillin allergy, first generation oral cephalosporins such as cephalexin and cefadroxil should be avoided, but all formulary IV cephalosporins and 2nd/3rd generation oral cephalosporins can be used safely.

Caring for Those With Pancreatic Cancer

Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month is an opportunity to continue the conversation about risk factors and advanced treatments at Virtua.

"Unfortunately, there are no early warning signs or screenings for pancreatic cancer," said medical oncologist and hematologist Seth Berk, MD. "Because the pancreas is buried deep within the body, symptoms can be easily missed. They can include belly or back pain, diabetes, nausea, and vomiting. Depending on the tumor's location, one may develop jaundice when the tumor is at the head of the pancreas, or sudden weight loss when the tumor is lower on the pancreas. If a person's weight suddenly drops by 15 pounds for no apparent reason, it's cause to investigate."

The average age for pancreatic cancer diagnosis is 71, according to Dr. Berk. "Family history certainly plays a role. If there is an incidence of chronic or hereditary pancreatitis, smoking, obesity, or long-standing diabetes, these can all increase risk and should be proactively managed when possible." For anyone with a family history of cancer, Virtua offers genetic testing and counseling, which includes telehealth visits with a licensed genetic counselor.

Pancreatic cancer treatment depends on the stage and location of the tumor. Virtua's multidisciplinary team includes board-certified hepatobiliary surgeons, <u>interventional gastroenterologists</u>, and experts from the <u>Penn Medicine | Virtua Health Cancer Program</u>, including medical oncologists and radiation oncologists. The team collaborates to develop each patient's plan which may include a combination of radiation, proton therapy, chemotherapy, or immunotherapy—all of which are provided in South Jersey. Through the Penn Medicine | Virtua Health Cancer Program, patients also have access to national clinical trials.
