Transition to Secure Chat to Take Place Oct. 10

Virtua Health is transitioning to Epic Secure Chat as part of the October Epic upgrade* on **Thursday, Oct. 10** for all person-to-person clinical secure messaging. Secure Chat will replace QliqCHAT for clinical communications and will be available in Epic on workstations as well as through Haiku and Rover. In preparation, any clinician who would like to use Secure Chat on their personal mobile device should download and activate Epic Haiku if they have not already done so. Please note that if you download/activate Haiku, Secure Chat will not be available until go-live on Oct. 10.

A <u>Secure Chat Home Page</u> is available with resources to help you transition to Secure Chat. The page includes information on how to access and use Secure Chat—including tip sheets—and frequently asked questions.

TeamBirth NJ is an evidence-based model that empowers patients to be active participants in decisions related to their care. During labor and delivery, patients and their support people huddle together with the entire care team to make informed decisions and voice their preferences.

TeamBirth is designed to enhance patient communication and ensure shared decision-making with the goal of improving maternal outcomes.

"In now launching TeamBirth at Virtua Our Lady of Lourdes, we are taking another critical step in ensuring that all families have access to quality, respectful, and equitable maternity care," said Virtua OB/GYN Chidinma Arole, MD, MPH, FACOG. "The practices of TeamBirth prioritize communication between the care team and the patient, strengthening their relationship, and setting the stage for the best possible outcomes for moms and babies."

Supply Chain Update: Possibility for Sustained Disruption

Two major global events are likely to impact product availability and the supply-chain process at Virtua. The first is Hurricane Helene, which caused significant damage to communities across the southeastern United States. The second is the labor strike of the International Longshoremen's Association, which represents tens of thousands of workers at 14 ports across the East Coast and Gulf of Mexico.

Although the full details and implications of these events are not presently known, Virtua's sourcing and clinical resource management team is being proactive. They are communicating with our major vendors and our buying group, HealthTrust, and have initiated conversations with key department leaders. A task force (with a dedicated Teams channel) will be established shortly.
